





MINECRAFT Mission Tour Goes LIVE Online

Sonoma State Historic Park has unveiled a groundbreaking educational initiative: a FREE Minecraft server designed to provide an immersive virtual tour of the San Francisco Solano Mission. This digital platform created by Brooke Sullivan, SHP Interpreter Specialist, with support from Tyler Markley, SHP Interpreter 1, represents a significant leap in educational innovation, aiming to make history both engaging and accessible to audiences of all ages. At its heart, this project seeks to captivate fourth-grade students and ignite a passion for learning about our state's rich heritage.

The digital re-creation of one of California's historic landmarks, Mission San Francisco Solano, offers users a unique opportunity to explore history in a dynamic and engaging manner. The project's launch marks a significant moment for California State Parks, positioning Sonoma State Historic Park as a pioneer in utilizing Minecraft for educational purposes. This endeavor aligns with the park's mission to preserve California's cultural treasures and to offer educational and recreational opportunities.



Brooke Sullivan: The development process has been an enjoyable and challenging experience. I poured my heart into this project because I wanted to create something that people would enjoy and take their time exploring. Pixel by pixel, I reconstructed the mission with meticulous attention to detail, ensuring a faithful representation of its historical significance. This initiative is not only about innovation but also accessibility. It allows individuals unable to visit the physical site the opportunity to see the mission from the architectural design to pixelated renditions of artifacts and the Jorgenson painting collection.



Tyler Markley: The project's objective is to meet young learners in their digital playground. Our goal is to bridge the traditional educational gap by integrating the interactive world of video games. By constructing the mission within Minecraft, we're engaging kids in a familiar environment, making learning about California's history appealing and relevant. We at the state parks want to provide high-quality programs for the public that help them learn about the amazing cultural and natural history across our state. I see this as a great opportunity to try to engage kids in a new way and I am sure we will see positive results as this project gets in front of more people.

For those unfamiliar with Minecraft, it's akin to a digital set of Legos that offers a limitless playground for the imagination. Picture a vast world made of blocks where you can build anything from a humble home to sprawling virtual cities. This versatility makes it an ideal platform for educational projects like the recreation of Mission San Francisco Solano.

Those interested in taking the tour of Mission San Francisco Solano need to either already have Minecraft or will need to purchase and download the game. Once Minecraft has been installed, you'll need to download the Curseforge app. Within the Curseforge app, you'll find the modpack specifically designed for our server. Downloading this modpack is crucial as it contains the necessary modifications and enhancements for your Minecraft experience on our server.

The server is active every Saturday and Sunday from 10:30 AM to 4:30 PM. To join, you will need to email **SonomaMissionMinecraft@gmail.com** by 4:30 PM on the Friday before your desired visit. Let us know your preferred time, and when that time arrives, we'll send you the IP password required to access the server.

In summary, this Minecraft server serves as more than just a link between the past and the digital era; it also showcases the commitment and ingenuity of its creators. By transforming the way we learn about history, Sonoma State Historic Park aims to inspire a new generation of students, encouraging them to explore California's rich heritage in a new and entertaining way.

Marshall Gold Discovery State Historic Park is only a couple of hours away up highway 50, in Coloma. We were there on a beautiful sunny Halloween day. There were very few visitors, so we basically had the entire park to ourselves. The historic buildings and mining machinery were in great shape. Walking along the American River, it was possible to imagine the "rush for gold" in 1848.

The visitors' center and museum had some terrific interactive exhibits and a movie highlighting the gold rush, local native tribes, and families whose history is connected to the Coloma Valley. We borrowed a State Park Pass from the library, so there was no charge to enter and park. In the summer you can pan for gold.

And a shout out to our local treasure. I never pass the Barracks without going in for a few minutes, and as I drive down Spain Street I marvel at the Mission, Toscano Hotel and Kitchen, Plaza, and Vallejo Home. Such historic significance right here in Sonoma.

Meeting the Descendants of Sarah:

Sarah Henderson Bigelow Flint Cooper Harris came to California in the 1840s with her small son and worked as a governess and teacher for the Bale family in Napa. She eventually moved to Sonoma, married James Cooper and helped him to run the Blue Wing Inn, which served as their home until they built a house south of town in 1849. She survived four husbands, had seven children and is an example of the sturdy women settlers who came West in the 1800s.

One day in late 2023, I was working at the Sonoma Valley Visitors Bureau and a group of five people came by and told me that they were in town researching their great-great-great uncle James Cooper. I gave them some suggestions on how to gather more information on him.

Then I mentioned that one of my favorite historical figures in Sonoma history was Sarah Henderson Bigelow Flint Cooper Harris. As I said her name they started saying it with me. They were stunned and one of the women in the group asked "How do you know of her?" I mentioned that her portrait and story were on display at the Toscano Hotel.

We talked for a while about her life and where she was buried (Sonoma Mountain Cemetery with the Coopers) and then that same woman held out her hand to me and said "I'm Sarah, named after my great-great-great aunt."

That was one of my most memorable moments at the visitors bureau - so exciting and so touching that it brought tears to my eyes to meet the descendants of Sarah – a remarkable woman!



Ukrainian Encounters at the Barracks:

Visitors and docents who read the interpretative panel in the Soldiers Room at the Barracks know that General Vallejo was sent to Sonoma by the Mexican government, in part, to protect Mexico's northern frontier from incursion by Russian nationals living at Fort Ross on Sonoma's coast. As a Barracks docent, I have wondered ever since the 2021 Russian invasion of Ukraine if the topic of Russia could engender any particular reaction or comments from contemporary visitors.

The answer came with a bang on a recent Sunday when a well-dressed couple with strong Slavic accents approached me with a barrage of questions about the relationship between the Mexicans and the Russians during the 19th century. Soon the couple explained that they are from Kiev (but currently living in San Francisco) and then proceeded to "school" me in why the Russian central government is illegitimate (as the husband continually referred to the "ugly bird" on Russia's flag): Kiev, they explained, was a 2000+ year old center of an empire that Russia basically co-opted and then moved its capital to Moscow, and the wife derisively added that Moscow's name actually means "swamp" or "bog"!

A Brief Remembrance of Leo Carrillo

The Carrillo name is one of the oldest Spanish European surnames of Southern California. Arriving with the Portola expedition in 1769 at San Diego, members of this Californio family involved themselves with Spanish-Mexican military and politics. Carrillos served as Presidio comandantes (San Diego and Santa Barbara), as city mayors (Los Angeles, Santa Barbara and Santa Monica) and later in the early California state senate. Another Carrillo, Francisca Benicia Carrillo, married Mariano Vallejo.

Leopoldo "Leo" Antonio Carrillo (1880-1961) was one of 11 children born to Juan Jose Carrillo (1842-1916) and Francisca Roland. After college, Leo pursued a career as a cartoonist for the San Francisco Examiner. He then went on to New York to work as a Broadway actor. He eventually moved back to California and on to the movie stages of Hollywood where he worked in over 90 films. He was a dialect specialist for many films and with a baritone voice spoke perfect English without any accent. His television persona in the 1950's was the role of Pancho in The Cisco Kid.

During this time, he also served for 18 years as a commissioner for California Beaches and Parks (today, California State Parks) and played a key role in acquiring Hearst Castle as well as the Los Angeles Arboretum and Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. Leo was present in Sonoma on March 10, 1946 as Governor Earl Warren raised the Bear Flag in the Sonoma Plaza and signed legislation for a Bear Flag Centennial commemoration.

Leo Carrillo State Park along Highway 1 in Los Angeles and Ventura Counties is named in his honor. Leo Carrillo Ranch Historic Park in Carlsbad, California is a historic rancho and a registered California Historical Landmark.
